### WESTERN NEW YORK

Last week would be the crop in Chautauque county which has been a large one. A large percentage of the crop was taken by the packing factories, although large quantities have been shipped to Fredonia commission houses.

Superintendent of Public Works Cagle has approved the plan to make the three islands in the Tonawanda brook near North Tonawanda into refuges. These refuges will be under the supervision and control of the conservation department.

This is the year 1922 can peaches, advises the state department of farms and markets. For the first time in years newspapers will this season have the combination of an abundance of fruit and of sugar at a reasonable price, says a department report.

After two lower courts had rejected their claims, Corning charitable institutions win \$235,000 from the estate of Mrs. Ethelalde Bump through a construction given the will of Oscar W. Bump, deceased banker and coal mine operator, of Corning by the court of appeals.

Franklin S. Noatman, poet, correspondent, versifier and bard of North Java, attains his 64th birthday on July 31. Although nearly blind he continues to supply his interesting material. His friends will remember his birthday with a third annual postage stamp shower. Such gifts will be appreciated.

Compromise ended a two-months' wage controversy between the Syracuse & Suburban Railroad company and its employes, when the men agreed to renew last year's contract. The company asked a reduction of one-third and the trolley men insisted upon an increase of that amount. Since May 1 the men have been receiving 41 cents an hour. They had been receiving 45 cents.

The Dairyman's Co-operative league Co-operative association, Inc., announces the pooled price for milk for the month of June of \$1.345 a hundred pounds, after expenses are deducted. This is the base price for milk testing 5 per cent butter fat at the 201-210-mile freight zone. Checks covering milk delivered during June are being mailed by the league to reach farmers not later than July 25.

Olean railroad men have started a back-to-the-farm movement, according to local real estate agents. Many of them have bought small farms and are making good at farming. It is reported. It is told that the independence of the farmer's life, with the appeal of the great outdoors and the health giving occupation, has made a steady jobs with good living.

The annual tour of the potato growers under the auspices of the Wyoming county farm bureau will be held this year on July 28.

Pearl B. Odell and her baby soon are to be separated. Considerable interest was created in Corning and vicinity two years ago in the case of Mrs. Odell, who was convicted jointly with her late husband, James Odell, a former machinist at the Ingersoll Rand plant at Painted Post, for the murder of Edward Knepf of Rochester. Odell was executed for the crime and Mrs. Odell was given a life sentence in Auburn. According to the former state law the child is allowed to remain with the mother for two years. The baby will be placed with relatives.

More straw hats were sold this summer in Rochester than ever before, Rochester dealers report.

Indications now point to the largest fruit crop in years in the vicinity of Youngstown this season.

Brookport is one hundred years old this year as it was in 1822 that the first survey for village lots was made.

Medina is to have a signal system announcing daily weather forecasts through the co-operation of the farm bureau.

S. Outwater company, makers of Christmas tree decorations, have established a manufacturing plant at Watkins.

Miss Alice Grinnell of Sodus, one of the youngest Wayne county contestants, won a Cornell scholarship at Lyons.

The State Association of Rural Mail Carriers will hold its annual convention in Canandaigua on Aug. 10 and 11.

Newark schools showed an attendance of 83 per cent of the number of scholars enrolled during the past school year.

An automobile dashed through a window of a bakery at Medina and landed in the midst of some sugared cream puffs.

The first number of the Avoca Weekly News, published and edited by George Peterson, formerly of Corning, has appeared.

Geneva will hold a special election on Aug. 8 to vote on an appropriation of \$25,000 to purchase land on the lake shore for a bathing beach.

Trial of the taxpayers' action against Corning city officials for alleged unauthorized payment of salaries has been postponed to October.

Olean has the reputation of being the driest city in Western New York. Thirty pilgrims announced that they could not procure a drink in the entire city.

Activities of the Near East Relief in New York state will be directed in future by John W. Mace of Brightwaters, L. I., national field director of the organization.

Fredonia school authorities are having the nine acres of the high school grounds, said to be the most beautiful in the state, laid out by landscape architects.

Flag cutting in the vicinity of Seneca Falls has become a great industry and no one will be permitted in the future to cut flag from state property without a permit.

When a swarm of bees entered the home of Holland Horton at Prattsburg through a chimney, William Halstead, a mail carrier, captured the swarm in a dishpan.

Frank L. Farrell, general manager of the United Paper Board company at Lockport, announced a general increase of 10 per cent in wages for employees of that concern.

Automobile owners of Western New York and Northern Pennsylvania are striving earnestly for the

building of an improved highway from Buffalo to Pittsburgh.

The new concrete road between Gowanda and Cattaraugus has been thrown open to traffic, making a continuous improved highway from Buffalo to Salamanca and Olean.

Philip D. Rupert, assistant manager of the Wayne county farm bureau, has resigned to become inspector of packing houses of the Western New York Fruit Growers' association.

The Webster Canning company has received an order for 18,000 pounds of apple butter which will be shipped during the next month to the various public institutions of the state.

Fruit growers from all parts of New York state are expected in Ithaca on Aug. 9 to take part in the summer meeting of the State Horticultural society at the college of agriculture.

De Verma Stettenbenz, who formerly was a reporter on the Buffalo Express and who also wrote under the name of John Smith, has been appointed managing editor of the Philadelphia Ledger.

Painted Post postoffice has been reduced from the second to the third class as the result of a falling off in business during the past year. The change has resulted in the resignation of two clerks.

Work has begun on a big pipe line from a point five miles west of Gowanda to the new Arkwright natural gas field southeast of Dunkirk. The product of two huge gas wells will be piped to Buffalo.

The state board of charities has rescinded the charter of the Erie county hospital nurses' training school. Lack of space handicapped the work at the hospital and the nurses cannot get sufficient training.
