WEEDS AND SMUT

Locate the Impure Seed Now For Next Years Sowing

Now is the time of year to visit the grain fields, especially oats and barley and observe the results of neglect in the seed used, says the County Farm Bureau Manager.

Smut on oats and barley is readily seen. The seriousness of this disease however, is not apparent to the casual observer as many of the smutted heads never emerge from the sheath of leaves and the straw of the diseased plant is generally shorter than that of the healthy plant.

One lot of seed sold quite extensively in this county last spring has been found to average about 8 per cent. smutted heads. The direct loss in these fields this year is bad enough but worse than this is going to be the spreading of the smut spores to many other farms by wind, birds, threshing machines, and in numerous other ways and thus the more general damage to the 1923 crop.

Inspect your field carefully before cutting. Play sure on the 1923 crop.

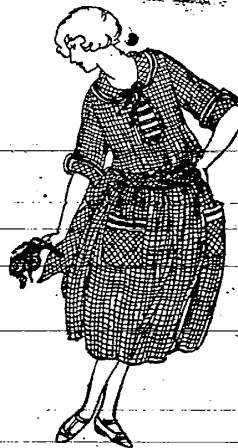
