BIDS AT ALBANY
Proposals For: Hallsport-Whitesville and Home-Pike Roads

Albany, July 23.—State Highway Commissioner Herbert S. Sison last Friday received the following bids for improving Allegany county roads. Hallsport-Whitesville Road 8 1/2 miles long with bituminous macadam. Three bidders, of whom Sweeney & Boland, Rochester, were lowest, at \$246,056, as compared with department engineer's estimate of \$277,286. Home-Pike Road, parts 1, A, and 1-B, 2 1/2 miles long with bituminous macadam. Three bidders, of whom P. M. Murray, Rochester, was lowest at \$71,697, as compared with department engineer's estimate of \$81,027.
