**RECORD COW LEADS STATE THIRD TIME**

**Aggie, Owned by Sam Barber, Scottsburg, Heads New York Association in Milk and Again in Butter Fat.**

For the third consecutive month Sam Barber's cow, Aaggie of the Livonia, Livingston county, dairy improvement association is the leading cow among associations of the state, according to the summary of testing work for June just received from the state agricultural college at Ithaca.

Her first record was in milk production, next she led in butter fat, and her last record was for both. Although her June butter fat production of 101.6 pounds was slightly less than during the previous month when she made 109.3 pounds, the quantity of milk increased from 2,268 pounds in May to 2,418 pounds in June.

**Has Great Record**  
She freshened on Washington's Birthday, 1922, and in the 130 days immediately following the tester for the Livonia association reports that she has produced 10,035.1 pounds of milk and 431.4 pounds of butter fat, and is still going strong.

Another Holstein-Friesian owned by Luther Carrier of the Oswego county association was second for June in both butter fat and milk producing 101.1 pounds of the former and 2,298 of the latter. Third place is held by another cow of the same breed owned by Dale Brothers of the first Niagara county association, with 84.1 pounds of fat and 2,262 pounds of milk.

**GARDEN TALKS**

**Early or Late, a Garden's First Rate Whatsoever a Man Soweth**

We know those people best whose fathers and mothers we have known. You may know something of the ancestors of some of your vegetables if you will save seed from year to year. Beans are especially easy to save.

Select healthy, productive vines. Avoid those having leaves crumpled downward and those having spots of any kind on the pods. Beans should be thoroughly dry when shelled and should be stored in a dry place. Before storing they should be treated with carbon bisulphide. Directions for this treatment may be obtained from the state college of agriculture at Ithaca. If only a few of seeds are to be saved they may be left untreated, and mixed with an equal amount of air-slacked lime. This does not kill weevils already present but prevents their increase.

Sweet corn for seed should be selected for earliness and for completely filled ears. It should preferably be grown at least twenty rods from other varieties of corn to avoid mixing.

Seed from peas, tomatoes, melons, cucumbers, pumpkins, and squashes is also easy to save. Those fruits with the most desirable characters should be selected. "Like begets like," "Blood will tell," "Like father, like son"—all these old maxims are as true in the plant world as among men and animals.

**HENS THAT GO BROODY NEED MASH AND WATER**

**But No Grain Until Ready to Lay Again—Small Coop and Good Care Start 'Em Working.**

Just because a hen is broody and wants to go off by herself and sit is no reason for putting her on jail rations, say the poultry experts at the state college of agriculture at Ithaca. She should be handled gently, have plenty of mash and fresh water, but no grain until she gets over being broody.

By watching the nests every night poultrymen are able to remove hens to special coops for special treatment at the first sign of broodiness and so interrupt the period of egg-laying for as short a time as possible. The length of time the bird will need to be confined will depend upon how soon she is removed to the broody coop after becoming broody, the room she has and the amount of food given her. Within reasonable limits, the smaller the coop in which she is jailed and the more mash and water she is given the quicker will biddy make up her mind to go to laying eggs again.

Close confinement and plenty of mash and water to stimulate egg production while the hen is resting will according to the specialists cure the most persistent "setters" in from three to six days.
