Pastures continue generally good in the state, according to the feeding specialists at the state college of agriculture at Ithaca. They recommend however, that as the grass gets more mature, cows be fed slightly more mature, cows be fed slightly more protein in the grain ration.

Cows on pasture should do well

through August, they say, on a ration containing 300 pounds hominy or corn meal, 300 pounds wheat bran, 300 pounds gluten feed, and 100 pounds oil meal or cottonseed meal.
