RUNNING WATER IN EVERY HOME, COUNTY-WIDE DEMONSTRATION

How every home may have running water will be shown thru a demonstration truck sent out by the New York State College of Agriculture under the auspices of the Farm and Home Bureau. DRAINS THIS YEAR SAVE COST IN CORN

The money lost in corn and beans on some farms in the state from the season's heavy rains would go a long way toward paying for proper drainage of wet fields, say the specialists at the State Agricultural College at Ithaca. Even where the soil was not wet enough to kill the corn, the college says, rain prevented cultivation when the weeds were small enough to kill them, altho in fields where corn was checked, cross cultivation has been more successful in weed control. The college recommends draining before liming and fertilizing on many farms.

HOME-MADE NITROGEN GIVES GRAIN PROFIT

The fact that nitrogenous fertilizer materials have advanced in price until they are quoted 50 per cent. higher than a year ago, leads the State Agricultural College at Ithaca to remark that unless grain prices advance there will be little, if any, profit in using commercial ammoniates at present prices.

The farmer who supplies the nitrogen needs of his field crops with farm-produced nitrogen is on the right road to economic production, the college adds.

GARDEN TALKS

Early or Late, a Garden's First Rate The Onion Moon

The Indians who were wont to name months by such events as plantings and harvests would have called this the Onion Moon. Late August or early September should see the home garden onions ripened and ready for hauling. If they are still green at that time the gardeners at the State Agricultural College recommend checking growth and hastening ripening by breaking down the tops. Some folks toll a barrel over them for this purpose. They should be pulled in dry weather and allowed to cure in the field for two or three days. Before storing cut away the top to within an inch or so of the bulb. Too close cutting may cause decay. Store onions in a dry place, cool but safe from freezing.
