# Farm Stock Market

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending August 21, 1922.)

### Fruits and Vegetables

Potatoe markets steady to firm during this week. New Jersey cobbler up 30c Philadelphia, 15c Chicago, 10c f. o. b. shipping points. Giants down in New York, firm Philadelphia. Kansas cobbler steady Kansas City, Nebraska, Kansas and Minnesota early Ohio's firm, carlot arrivals light. Peach markets slightly higher. Eastern Elbertas up 25c to 50c. Midwestern stock 25c to 50c higher in leading markets. Cantaloupes stronger. California salmon tints up 75c to \$1.25 New York and Boston; 25c to 50c higher other markets. Eastern green meats up 50c to 75c. Prices reported Aug. 21: New Jersey sacked cobbler No. 1 up 10c to 15c mostly \$1.35 to \$1.85. New York \$1 to \$1.10 per 100 lbs. steady \$1 to \$1.15 f. o. b. New Jersey giants 75c to \$1.15 Eastern markets. Kansas cobbler steady Kansas City \$1.15 to \$1.25. Kansas, Nebraska and Minnesota early Ohio's partly graded \$1 to \$1.16 in the Middlewest 80c to 95c f. o. b. Wisconsin bulk round whites, partly graded, \$1.15 Chicago. Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and New Jersey Elberta peaches sixes and bushel baskets mostly \$2.50 to \$3.50. Missouri, Arkansas, Illinois and Indiana stocks \$1.75 to \$2.75. California salmon tints cantaloupes standards 45¢, \$3.25 to \$5. Eastern green meats \$2 to \$3. Colorado green meats \$4 Chicago. Massachusetts yellow globe onions No. slightly weak, Philadelphia and Boston \$2.50 to \$2.75 per 100 lbs. \$2.25 to \$2.35 f. o. b. Connecticut Valley points. New York Orange County yellow stock \$2.25 to \$2.40 New York City. Midwestern and Wash. yellow varieties \$2.25 to \$2.50 leading markets. New York Oldenburg apples A2 1/2, \$2 to \$2.25 per barrel New York and Boston steady other markets 65c to 75c per bu. Michigan stock same range Chicago. Missouri Wealthys No. 1, \$3 to \$3.25 barrel Kansas City. Michigan Barret pears bushel baskets \$1.25 to \$1.35 f. o. b. shipping points.

### Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices showed net declines of 25 to 35c for the week, medium and light hogs declining most. Beef steers' prices were 25 to 50c higher and butcher cows and heifers firm to 25c higher. Feeder steers firm to 10c higher and light and medium weight veal calves 50 to 75c higher. Fat lambs advanced 25 to 50c but feeding lambs were weak to 25c higher. Yearlings firm to 25c higher and fat ewes unchanged. On Aug. 21st light weight hogs were steady to firm with others generally slow and weak compared with Saturday's average. Beef steers and yearlings closed generally 10 to 15c lower, butcher cows and heifers steady while stockers and feeders were strong to

25c higher. Veal calves 50c lower. Sheep and lambs mostly steady. Aug. 21st Chicago prices: Hogs, top \$9.75; bulk of sales \$7.25 to \$9.50; medium and good best steers \$8 to \$10.50; butcher cows and heifers \$3.90 to \$9.25; feeder steers \$5.40 to \$7.85. Light and medium weight veal calves \$10.50 to \$12; fat lambs \$12 to \$18; feeding lambs \$11.25 to \$12.50; yearlings \$8.75 to \$11; fat ewes \$3.50 to \$7.65. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending Aug. 11th were: Cattle and calves 35,895; hogs 3,278; sheep 54,580. Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices showed mixed movement for the week. Beef and fresh pork loins steady to \$1 lower while lamb and mutton were generally firm to \$1 higher. Veal generally steady, the medium grade showed a \$2 decline at some markets. On Aug. 21st, better grades of beef generally firm with other grades steady. Veal, lamb and pork loins ranged from steady to \$1 higher. Mutton prices not changed. Aug. 21st prices good grade meats: Beef \$16 to \$18; veal \$15 to \$18; lamb \$24 to \$28; mutton \$13 to \$18; light pork loins \$23 to 27; heavy loins 1 to 19.

### Grain

Chicago wheat market uncertain for week; prices had downward tendency and closed slightly lower. Temporary upturn middle of week but advance more than lost later. Main bearish factors were decline in Liverpool market; restricted export business; increase in Canadian crop estimates; weakness in coarse grains as result of rains over corn belt. Chicago Sept. wheat 7/8c lower; Chi. Sept. corn 2c higher. On Aug. 21, wheat sold at new low for season but rallied toward last and closed higher. Early weakness in

St. Louis, \$20.50. No. 1 alfalfa Memphis \$22.50, Omaha \$15; No. 1 prairie St. Louis \$16, Omaha \$18.50, Minneapolis \$14, Chicago \$19.

### Feed

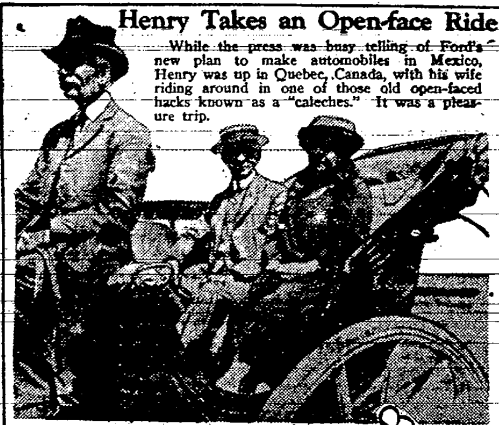
Feed markets featureless. Offerings and demand light. Increased storage of wheat feeds reported. Export inquiry for all meats disappointing. Prices with few exceptions unchanged. Alfalfa meal firm, good inquiry for spot stuff, light demand for future shipment. New drop beet pulp offered at about \$20 per ton less than old crop stuff in many markets. Receipts and movement light. Quoted Aug. 21: Bran \$14, middlings \$16, flour middlings \$21.50, rye middlings \$14, 38% linseed meal \$43 Minneapolis. White hominy feeds \$24.50 St. Louis, \$25 Chicago. No. 1 alfalfa meal \$21 Omaha \$22.25 St. Louis gluten feed \$29.85 Chicago. 36% cottonseed meal \$34 Atlanta, \$34 Memphis, beet pulp, new crop \$33 Cincinnati.

### Butter

Butter markets firm during the week with price tendency still upward. Hot weather affecting both quality and quantity of receipts on markets resulting in reduced supply of fancy grades. Some export inquiry for under grades. Closing prices: 92 score butter: New York 26c, Philadelphia 37c, Boston 36 1/2c, Chicago 34 1/2c. Cheese markets steady. Peak of production past and seasonal shrinkage has begun. Lighter available supplies and good demand have caused better feeling among the trade. Prices at Wisconsin primary cheese markets Aug. 19: Twins 19 1/2c, Daisies 18 1/2c; Double Daisies 18 1/2c; Young Americas 19c; Longhorns 19 1/2c; Square Prints 21 1/2c.
