Richard Lloyd Jones says The School House Leads Us



Democracy has defects. Our government is not without fault. But with all our faults we have a better government than anything any other country in any other clime or time has ever produced.

We are a people of big ideas, and compared to the rest of the world, small faults. Europe is a continent encumbered with monumental faults and little ideas.

That is shown quite as much in her mechanical and inventive ingenuity as in her parliamentary practices.

The Swiss will make a very intricate and delicate watch which will do many things, ring bells, tell the time of tide, the season of the moon and still, as the Yankee would say, have a saucerful of wheels left over.

We make a pocket piece that keeps time. That's the main idea. That is what a watch is for.

The French and the Germans make more complicated cameras than any we produce. But we do what they don't; we put a simple little camera into every home, and collect the priceless snapshot memories of life as we live it.

These are but evidences of our tendencies. We get a big idea and use it.

Europe and Asia live largely in darkness because their schools have been for the select and the masses are illiterate. They seek to cultivate a few minds to superlative intelligence. We do no less, and we do vastly more; we cultivate all minds as far as we can encourage every mind to go.

Behold the little red school house, the cornerstone of our greatness. It has done wonderful things for our country. Now it is going to do more.

Just about the time that Europe and Asia are beginning to get the essential idea we are pushing the little red school houses together into the big brick, modern, metropolitan Consolidated School, with all its better equipment, social lessons, assemblies and better teachers. Now we are making the school work play.

We are beginning to teach by eye as well as by ear. The film is going to be a better story-teller of history and geography, a better revealer of biology and botany than any book.

For a long time we graded our pupils by averages, holding the bright boy back, which discourages the slow boy. But now comes Dr. A. H. Sutherland, another pedagogue of distinction, who out in Los Angeles has demonstrated the value of de-grading our schools so that the slow boy is encouraged rather than discouraged, helped rather than handicapped, and the quick boy is not held back.

We're a long way ahead of the rest of the world, and we're going to keep a long way ahead.

Grain Grain prices uncertain with a narrow range during the week, but averaged higher. Maine market factors were improved foreign demand and buying by exporters, strength in corn, and advance in Liverpool markets on the 8th. Chicago Dec. wheat up 1c. Chicago Dec. corn up 1 1/2c. Wheat prices ahead fractionally lower on the 14th. Market lacked support, cash market weak, poor demand, and there was an increase in the visible supply. Visible supply wheat \$1,160,000 bu. compared with \$1,120,000 bu. same time last year. Corn lower on rains and cooler weather over the heavy receipts and falling off in cash demand. Visible supply corn 7,780,000 bu. compared with 11,200,000 bu. same time last year. Closing prices in Chicago cash market: No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.05; No. 2 hard winter wheat \$1.03; No. mixed corn 64c; No. 2 yellow corn 64c; No. 3 white oats 36c. Kansas City Dec. wheat 95 1/2c. Winnipeg Dec. wheat 94c. Dairy Products Better market firm for the week. Hot weather has continued to cut down production and has reduced percentage of fancy grades in current arrivals. Storage goods beginning to move in a small way. Oldenburgs \$2.50-\$2.75 Midwestern Jonathans and other red varieties \$2.25-\$3.25 in Midwestern cities. The trend of hog price was upward for the week, advance ranging from 16-35c per 100 lbs. Cattle prices, on the other hand, declined slightly.

Feed Steers weak to 10c lower, fat 10c lower to 10c higher, while hogs averaged about steady. Feeder steers and veal calves remained practically steady. The sheep and lamb markets showed slight changes. Fat lambs advanced \$2-\$3; feeder lambs and yearlings steady, while fat ewes were weak to 50c lower for the week. On Sept. 11 hogs on the Chicago market opened slow, around steady, closed steady to strong with Saturday's average. Beef steers and yearlings fully steady, other grades generally 10-25c lower; butcher cows and heifers steady to weak; bulls largely 15c higher; veal calves 25-50c lower; stealer and feeders weak to 25c lower. Sept 11 Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$9.85, bulk of sales \$8.80-\$9.50; medium and good beef steers \$4.75-\$9.25; feeder steers \$3.65-\$8.10; light and medium weight veal calves \$11-\$12.25; fat lambs \$12.25-\$13.25; feeding lambs \$11.50-\$12.75; yearlings \$8.50-\$11; fat ewes \$3-\$8.75. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending Sept. 1 were: Cattle and calves 126,294; hogs 4,148 sheep 86,539. Eastern wholesale fresh meat markets showed considerable irregularity. Beef 50-51 higher, lamb steady, veal and fresh pork 10-11 lower to \$1 higher and mutton \$1 lower to \$3 higher per 100 lbs. On Sept. 11 beef ranged from \$12-\$22 higher, veal generally \$1-\$2 higher on better grades with common veal weak to \$1 lower. Good grade

lamb firm to \$1 higher with lower grades \$1-\$2 lower at some markets. Mutton and fresh pork prices general-ly steady. Sept. 11 prices good grade meats: Beef \$16-\$17.50, veal \$16-\$22; lamb \$20-\$27; mutton \$12.15-\$15.50; light pork loins \$26-\$37; heavy loins \$15-\$20. Market generally weak. Prices \$1 lower at New York and St. Louis. Other markets practically unchanged. Receipts have fallen off. Reports of country loadings light. Receipts principally of only medium quality. Good hay scarce. Poor hay selling at rather wide discounts. Quoted Sept. 9: No. 1 Timothy Boston \$26.50, New York \$25.50, Phila. \$20, Pittsburg \$19, Cincinnati \$17, Chicago \$19, St. Louis \$18, Atlanta \$22.50. No. 1 alfalfa, Omaha \$16. No. 1 Prairie Omaha \$12.75, Chicago \$17. Feed Market continues firm on wheat feeds. Mill offerings light but demand also limited. Production, however, continues about normal. High protein feeds weak but market practically unchanged. Hominy feed about 50c higher on strength in corn market. Alfalfa meal firm. Quoted Sept. 9: Spring wheat bran Chicago \$17.75, Phila. \$22.50; winter bran St. Louis \$18.50; standard middlings Chicago \$18.75, Pittsburgh \$22.50. Lined meal New York \$46, Chicago \$38.50. Alfalfa meal St. Louis \$23, Omaha \$21, Gluten Chicago \$30-\$35. White hominy St. Louis \$23.50, Phila. \$31.
