DENTAL HYGIENE AND THE ANIMALS

Did you ever see a lion brush his teeth? Does your dog have to brush his teeth night and morning to keep his beautiful white fangs so bright and clean? If the animals don't brush their teeth why should we? If you want to find out, go to the Auditorium on Saturday evening, Sept. 23rd, and see the picture which they have secured from the State Department of Health called "Dental Hygiene and the Animals."

The picture, a new one recently released, includes some fascinating pictures of wild animals taken at the great New York Zoo. Of course, its object is to teach the care of the teeth. The whole story is based on the little boy and girl who don't see why they have to fuss over their teeth when the animals don't have to bother. The story is so interestingly told and the animal pictures are so absorbing that the lesson is sugar-coated and probably, for this reason makes a deeper impression and carries more weight especially with children, than dry matter-of-fact teaching.

VETERINARIAN LOCATES AT ALFRED

Dr. Walter J. Taylor, employed for the past six years as live stock expert and veterinarian by the Panama Canal Zone Government, has opened an office in Alfred for the practice of veterinary medicine and surgery. After graduating from Cornell in the class of 1906, Dr. Taylor taught two years in the New York State Veterinary College. He was employed one year by the State Department of Agriculture under Civil Service as state veterinarian, his work consisting mainly of testing cattle for tuberculosis when the eradication of that disease was first inaugurated.

In the fall of 1909 he went to the Montana Agricultural College where he organized and equipped the Department of Veterinary Science. After four years service at Montana, he was called to the California Agricultural Experiment Station for investigation in animal diseases.

In 1916, upon the recommendation of the chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry at Washington, he was sent by the United States Government to the Canal Zone for the purpose of eradicating a serious outbreak of anthrax among the cattle of the supply department. While this commission only called for a service period of six months, his services were retained for six years until June of this year when he resigned to come to Alfred to live with his family, as he has a son in Alfred University and has purchased a home there.
