CONCOURSE AMENDMENT CONCERNING CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS SECTION 1. That section 1 of the constitution be amended to read as follows: SECTION 1. The State shall be a union of equal states, each of which shall have the right to be heard in its own defense, and no state shall be deprived of its equal representation in the Senate without its consent.
