NINETY DAYS WITH A PASSPORT

Berlin we started westward for the province of Hannover. Our first stop was the splendid city of Hannover. Here the people seemed like Anglo-Saxons. Hannover is a great business city. Everywhere there were evidences of business prosperity. It was the Kingdom of Hannover that furnished the present royal house of Great Britain and, strange to say, both Hindenburg and President Elbert came from the province of Hannover. After a two-hour stay in the city of Hannover, we again took the train, this time for Asnabruck. The next day we visited the Asnabruck town hall and saw the spot where the treaty of Westphalia was signed. You will recall that this treaty ended the Thirty Years' War. Two weeks before our visit, the town board voted to remove a statue of Wilhelm I, which stood for many years in this same room. In Asnabruck is the bank where the former Crown Prince keeps his money (not paper marks you may be sure) and it was this banker who is said to have furnished the automobile in which the one time prince fled across the border into Holland. The Crown Prince is not at all popular in Hannover. They hate him because he so ruthlessly used-up soldiers under his command. There is a strong sentiment in Hannover for a separation from Prussia and a union with the Rhine province. These sections of Germany have not been strongly Prussianized. From Asnabruck we started south for Cologne, to take the steamer for the famous Rhine trip. On the way to Cologne we stopped at Ohlings, adjoining Solingen, where a vast deal of the German cutlery comes from. Ohlings is in "occupied territory," under British troops. The entire German Rhine country is under Allied control. The Germans are doing a

great deal of unnecessary complaining about the presence of the Allied troops in this part of the country. They particularly condemn the French. The Germans along the Rhine look much more prosperous than those in the eastern provinces. In justice to the German children it must be said that they look anaemic thru lack of milk and butter. This is true of all parts of the country. Merchants are well-off in Germany, and along the Rhine they can obtain milk and anything else that they wish because they can pay for it. If a lessening of the reparations would help the poor people of Germany, than it would be a good thing; but it seems to us that the merchants would reap the greatest benefit from any softening of terms. The stores are choked with goods; and in spite of high prices, sales are so brisk that many of the merchants keep open only half a day, because they do not wish to sell and "re-buy at advanced prices."

The purchasers at such sale shall pay the amounts of their respective bids to the County Treasurer within 48 hours after the last day of sale, and receive certificates describing the land or property purchased, the sum paid and the time when the purchased will be entitled to deeds; and after the expiration of one year from the last day of such sale, they shall be entitled to receive conveyances of the lands or property so purchased by them respectively unless the owner or occupant thereof, or some other person entitled therein, pursuant to law, shall have previously redeemed the same by paying to the County Treasurer for the use of the purchaser, his heirs or assigns the sum mentioned in the certificate with interest at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum from the date of such certificate, any tax which the holder of such certificate shall have paid between the days of sale and redemption together with the share of the expense of the publication of notice for unpaid taxes as apportioned by the County Treasurer to the real estate so redeemed.
