## AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE FOURTEEN OF THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION ONE.—RELATING TO ABSENT VOTERS.

Congress has enacted into law, section sixty-eight of the Constitution of the State of New York, which provides that in case of the occurrence of any general election be unable to go to the polls because of their residence beyond the boundaries of their soldiers' and sailors' home, or because their duties of occupation require them to vote, and for the return and canvass of their votes, in the election district in which they respectively reside.

§ 2. Resolved (in the Senate concurred). That the foregoing amendment be referred to the legislature to be voted upon at the time prescribed by article four of the constitution to be published on or before the twentieth day of such election.
