JUGGLING FIGURES

IN ANOTHER column of this issue of the News will be found a paid advertisement for the Republican County Committee. In accordance with the policy of the Andover News to allow any one and every one latitude to give publicity to their opinions so long as their statements are clean, and they pay for the privilege, we publish this advertisement.

In fairness to the editorial policy of the News, we wish it distinctly understood that the sentiments expressed in this advertisement are not our sentiments, but those of the advertiser, the Republican County Committee.

We call the attention of our readers to this advertisement for two reasons. First because Chairman Higgins of the Republican County Committee in his letter enclosing the copy for the advertisement requested us to do so. Second, because we wish to correct a wholly wrong implication which the advertisement expresses.

The figures given are undoubtedly correct. The thing that is not correct, and which every voter should use his own common sense in applying, and does know himself, if he stops to use his thinker, is the statement that the Miller administration has saved Allegany County a large sum of money. This is NOT true.

While the state tax was larger under Governor Smith's administration than that under Governor Miller, it is also true that Governor Miller's administration received from Allegany County people thousands of dollars more than did the Smith administration, in the way of direct income tax. The state treasury was enriched thousands and thousands of dollars from the Allegany County pocket-books more during the Miller than the Smith administration.

Why should the state tax be as large when the Republicans picked the pockets of every individual in the county with an income of \$2,000 a year, for a percentage of their profits?

The Smith administration was at a time directly after the war when everything was exorbitantly high, when everything cost double, when the dollar was worth only about 50 cents and yet his administration spent less money than has the Miller administration.

All of the labored, tricky declarations of Governor Miller that he has been an economical administrator of the affairs of the state have been demolished. The Miller assertions of saving money for the taxpayers have been shown to be unfounded. Facts show the contrary to be the case.

Governor Miller claims that in his two years he has saved money for the state. But, in point of fact, his claim in any substantial sense is untrue. The figures of appropriations are no mystery. They appear in the official report of the Comptroller of the State of New York.

The facts are that in the two years of the Smith administration the figures reached the sum of \$236,000,000, and in the two years of Governor Miller's administration they reached the sum of \$291,000,000.

Now, these are the facts. No one can, in the face of these official records, deny that under Governor Miller the Legislature appropriated \$55,000,000 more than it appropriated under the Smith administration, and if the special sessions are taken into account they appropriated \$62,000,000 more under Governor Miller's administration than under Smith's.

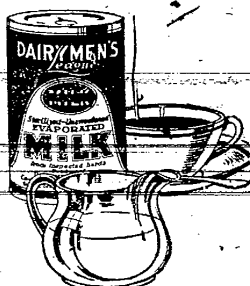
