Of Interest to Farmers

LIMITS ON FLOOR SPACE OF A HOME

Thousand Square Feet to Each Floor of Two-Story House Set as Maximum for Convenience

Four to six persons can be accommodated with the greatest ease as regards light, air, warmth and care within a area of 700 to 1,000 square feet on each floor of a two-story house.

This is a statement made at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca by home economics workers in calling attention to the fact that many homes are not arranged for greatest convenience and comfort of the family.

Doors and passages, they show should be arranged that draught, disturbance, and dirt may be avoided, and doors should be as few in number as possible for usefulness in order to save wall space for furniture.

The outside door should not open directly into a living room. The stairway should not open directly into a living room. One room should not be used as the only passageway to another.

Windows Vital Need Enough windows for light and ventilation are vital. The total window area of a room should be not less than one-fifth nor more than one-fourth of the floor area.

Too few windows mean poor ventilation, and a dark interior which requires very light color schemes. Too many windows mean waste of heat, but glaring interior which will require heavy curtaining or dark color schemes to absorb the excess light.

Windows should be made tight against weather to save heat, and tight against rattling to save nerves. For bedrooms and the kitchen windows are needed on two outside walls.

To facilitate orderly housekeeping, a generous coat closet or small room should be provided near the outer door. A general cleaning closet should be accessible to all parts of the house, but it should not be in the kitchen. A clothes closet should be provided for each bedroom, and there should be a linen closet convenient to all of the bedrooms.

Both cellar space and attic space should contribute to extra storage.

To yield to this temptation results inevitably in the reproduction of poor species and the rapid deterioration of the woodlot. When working in your woods, keep an eye to the future.

CLOVER LEAF HAS NEW MEANING NOW

Color of Border on Emblem Indicates Time Wearer Has Been Junior Project Worker

There is a new meaning in the four leaf clover "achievement pins" which the office of the state leader of junior extension at Ithaca is now sending out to the boys and girls of the state week, under the auspices of the Allegany County Tuberculosis Committee, and conducted by Dr. Stanley L. Wang, chest specialist, of New York City.

At Alfred, on Tuesday, October 24th, nineteen persons were examined. Dr. Wang was assisted by Miss Laura P. Vogel, R. N., Executive Secretary of the Tuberculosis Committee, Miss Bessie A. Williams, R. N., County Tuberculosis Nurse, and Mrs. Rogers, a trained nurse, and Mrs. Mabel Reynolds, also, years receive a gold pin with a black border.

More than 13,000 farm boys and girls of the state are now engaged in these various projects in homemaking and agriculture, and all of them are entitled to achievement pins if they finish their work satisfactorily. The pins are furnished by the State Bankers Association, which is much interested in this work for boys and girls.

OLD WAR TAG FOUND

It Identifies Soldier Missing Since Civil War Battle

While digging a post hole in the heart of Fredericksburg, Va., P. L. Harris and Willard Cooper unearthed an identification tag, evidently all that remained of a soldier buried in the street during the Civil War battle there. The tag bore the inscription: "M. Smith, 148, Reg. Vols., New Bethlehem, Pa. War of 1861."

Answering a letter sent to the postmaster of New Bethlehem in an endeavor to trace the dead soldier's relatives, W. Y. Smith of that city, editor of the Vindicator Publishing Company, stated that the dead man was his brother, of whom he had found no trace since he was reported missing after the battle of Fredericksburg, and that he was anxious to get the tag and publish the story of the finding in his magazine. — Baltimore-American.
