Fruits and Vegetables

Eastern potato markets steady to firm for the week; Chicago slightly weaker. Prices up 10-15c at New York and Maine shipping points, weaker northern and western points.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices ranged 45-80c lower for the week. Beef steer prices ranged from 20c lower to 15c higher; butcher cows and heifers and feeder steers 20-25c down; white veal-calf prices declined 75c-1.25.

Butter markets firm during the week, with price tendency continuing upward. Production decreasing; supplies of fancy grades short and held at such high prices as to stimulate demand for lower grades also.

Grain prices made net gains for the week. Strength in Liverpool and Winnipeg, removal of impediments against sales for export and improved cash and milling demand were leading factors.
