REV. JOHN SANBORN DEAD

John Wentworth Sanborn, A. M., whose death occurred Oct. 14th, 1922, at his home in Friendship, was born Nov. 3rd, 1813, at Eppiny, N. H. Aside from his work as a pastor in the Genesee Conference, Rev. Sanborn was exceptionally well versed in Indian lore and traditions. He was adopted by the Senecas and given the name "O-Yo-Ga-Weh" meaning sky without a cloud. He served as commissioner of Indian affairs at the World's Fair in Chicago, Ill., and director-in-chief of the New York State Indian exhibit.
