

SMITH WINS BUFFALO BY 15,000 VOTES

Col. Donovan Received Plurality of 8,706 Votes

In a vote in which Alfred E. Smith, Democratic candidate for governor, swept Buffalo by 15,000 over Gov. Miller, the remainder of the Republican ticket stood up well. The only other Republican loss was in the 4th senate district Democratic district, where William E. Martin was defeated for reelection for senator by Robert E. Lacey, Democrat. Carl Sherman, Democrat and a local man, carried the city by 1,471 over Rogers, the Republican candidate for attorney general.

Col. W. J. Donovan, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, and Guy B. Moore, Republican candidate for reelection for district attorney, made remarkable gains. Col. Donovan was high man in Buffalo on the Republican ticket, receiving a plurality of 8,706. Guy B. Moore had a plurality in the city of 14,140, close to 30,000 votes more than were given to Gov. Miller.

The Republicans retain the two congress districts and the six assembly districts out of the eight in the county, which they held, and two of the three senate districts.

They elected Asher B. Emery, Edward R. O'Malley and James E. Norton to the supreme court.

Senator Calder got 3,052 plurality in Buffalo. The towns of the county increased the Republican pluralities and cut down Smith's plurality by about 3,000 votes. Fred C. Galse, Rep., was re-elected county auditor.

LaFollette Piles Up Big Vote.
Senator Robert M. LaFollette, a five to one favorite in the Wisconsin election, has been elected a United States senator by a majority conservatively estimated to exceed 200,000 over his opponent, Mrs. Jessie Jack Hooper, who headed the Democratic independent ticket.

Deluge of Votes for Beer.
A deluge of votes has been cast in favor of light wines and beer in East St. Louis, Bloomington, Peoria and Kankakee, according to wires received in Chicago by A. B. Plamondon, at the Association Opposed to Prohibition headquarters there.

G.O.P. MAJORITY IN STATE LEGISLATURE WILL BE REDUCED

Majority in Senate Reduced to One Assembly Will Probably Not Exceed Ten.

Revised returns give the Democrats control of the state senate by a margin of one. The Republicans apparently retain control of the assembly by a majority which can be counted on the fingers of one hand.

The complexion of the senate and assembly of New York state underwent quite a change as a result of the election. Republicans will have a majority of 1 in the senate, which will now consist of 26 Republicans and 25 Democrats. The present state senate is made up of 39 Republicans, 11 Democrats and 1 Socialist.

With four districts incomplete the tabulation for the new state assembly showed 76 Republicans and 70 Democrats. The present state assembly shows 102 Republicans, 47 Democrats and 1 Socialist.

It will be seen that the Democratic landslide in the Empire State has given the Republicans very bare working majorities in both houses.

N. Y. Congressional Delegation

With two districts still missing, the new state delegation to congress from New York is made up of 18 Republicans and 25 Democrats, which is a gain of about 15 seats for the Democrats.

Mine Deaths Now Total 80.
Recovery of five more bodies in the Reilly mine at Spangler, Pa., has brought the total known dead up to 80 and accounted for all of the 112 men officially listed as having been in the mine when the explosion took place.

Wool Growers Get Pleasing Price.
Venango county, Pa., wool growers have sold their pool of 18,000 pounds for an average of 45 cents a pound, including the delaines. An announcement by the association says that the men are pleased with the grading and the price.

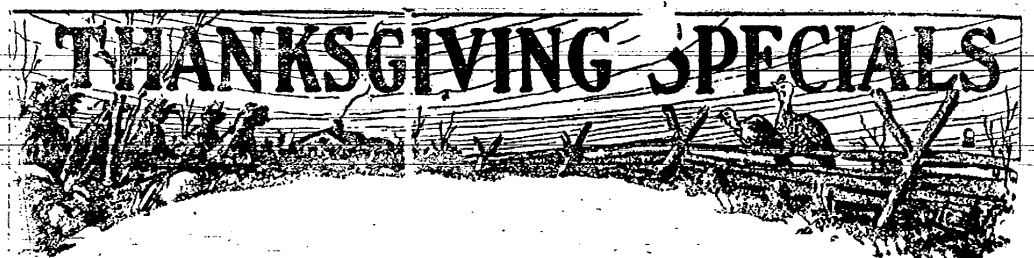

The purchasers at such sale shall pay the amounts of their respective bids to the County Treasurer within 48 hours after the last day of sale, and receive certificates describing the land or property purchased, the sum paid and the time when the purchased will be entitled to deeds; and after the expiration of one year from the last day of such sale, they shall be entitled to receive conveyances of the lands or property so purchased by them respectively unless the owner or occupant thereof, or some other person, entitled therein, pursuant to law, shall have previously redeemed the same by paying to the County Treasurer for the use of the purchaser, his heirs or assigns the sum mentioned in the certificate with interest at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum from the date of such certificate, any any tax which the holder of such certificate shall have paid between the days of sale and redemption together with the share of the expense of the publication of notices to redeem the real estate sold for unpaid taxes as apportioned by the County Treasurer to the real estate so redeemed.
