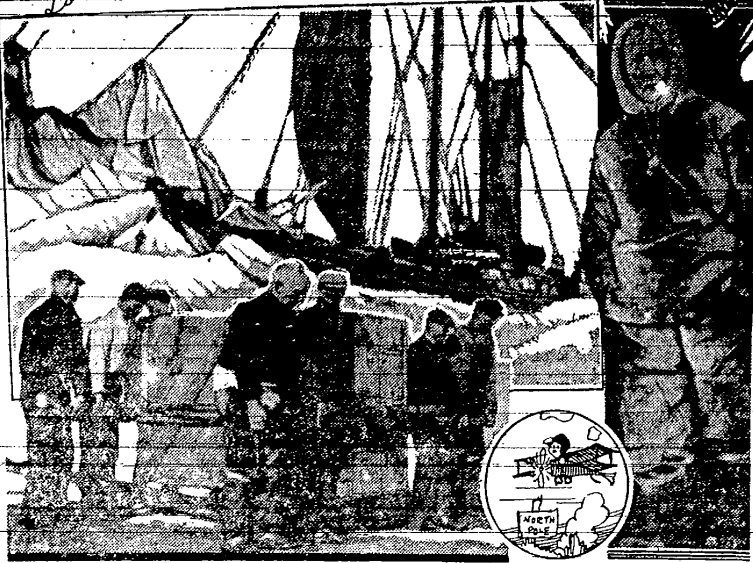


### Exclusive Pictures of Amundsen in Arctic Snows Making Ready for Air Trip to North Pole.



In a door of a little hut 80 miles from Point Barrow, in the Arctic wastes, stands the grizzled and gray explorer, Capt. Amundsen, awaiting what seems an opportune hour during the long Polar night for the first airplane flight over the Top of the World—to the North Pole. These exclusive photographs are the first brought back of the hearty Norwegian explorer since his ship "Maud" anchored off Point Hope. Lower picture shows Capt. acre park of beautiful gardens and trees. We cannot go into detail about the building, but it may be interesting to note the contributions made by the different nations.  
Italy presented marble columns; France gave a huge painting and a Gobelin tapestry; England gave stained glass windows; Germany, large bronze entrance gates; Belgium, the wrought iron door with bronze and the bronze doors of the vestibule; Sweden gave granite for columns; Norway also gave granite; Denmark gave a fountain in the courtyard; Japan, silk tapestries and cartoons; Austria, several pieces of marble statuary on the landing of the great staircase; Turkey and Rumania, carpets; China, most marvellous huge colored vases; San Salvador and Brazil, valuable wood used for the walls; the Dutch Colonies (East and West Indies) sent teak (a dark, heavy, oily, durable timber which will neither warp nor crack); Argentina, a statue of the famous "Christ of the Andes" for the staircase; Russia, a huge Jasper vase; Italy, an abundance of beautiful marble; Hungary, some precious vases; several South American states, timber; while Holland added to her gift of land some marvellous old wall decorations by Ferdinand Bol. The grand staircase of marble with the gilded candelabra was the gift of the City of The Hague.

"Thus has the Palace of Peace, the foundation of Andrew Carnegie, become a historical and universal monument of the desire for peace. At the same time it is a monument of architecture and of artistic and sumptuous disposition.  
From our host at the hotel in The Hague we learned a little of Holland's difficulties during the World War. The Dutch furnished Germany with milk in return for coal and often had little milk left for themselves. The people of Holland raise very few of the raw materials which their industries demand; they import most of these from the colonies. Thus, with shipping interrupted, work became scarce and prices soared. At present incomes as low as 2000 gulden (\$800) are taxed about 10%. Large incomes are taxed at much higher percentage.  
No country in Europe attracted us as much as Holland for sturdiness of character and enterprise, for the placidness and quiet of its every-day country life. It was with profound regret that we said good bye to the Netherlands, and took the Channel steamer at the Hook of Holland, for England.
