FOR HEALTH THE CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE

The annual sale of Christmas Seals will be begun here on December 1st

under the auspices of the Allegany County Tuberculosis Committee. Dr. John Common is the campaign chairman.
 The effective part played by the local committee in the campaign which in the state outside of New York City during the past fifteen years has reduced the tuberculosis death rate by one-third, the enlarged popular understanding of the public benefit to be derived from the systematic tuberculosis work and the improved economic conditions throughout the state give the campaign workers confidence that the local goal will be reached or exceeded this year.
 The local committee will seek to raise \$500.00 in a campaign that will last thru December.
 The organized fight against tuberculosis has been brought to a high

degree of efficiency in this county. The program for 1923, which is dependent for support on the Christmas Seal Sale, involves a greater intensification of the work of the existing agencies, the carrying of the campaign to the sources of the disease in unhygienic conditions in homes and working places and special preventive educational and nutritional work among the children.
 The Christmas Seals supply practically all of the funds for voluntary organized work against tuberculosis. Voluntary work has inspired, stimulated and accelerated practically all public work. Fifteen years ago tuberculosis was popularly regarded as incurable and there was practically no public provision for combating it. Now there are tuberculosis committees in every county but two, thirty-

eight public tuberculosis hospitals in New York State outside of New York City, and a large number of open air camps, open air schools, visiting nurses, clinics and dispensaries.
 Beginning on December 1st, members of the local committee will personally solicit funds and acknowledge the large contributions with health bonds. After their canvass the seals will be mailed in blocks of 100 to people whom the local committee feel will be found responsive to the appeal.
 The seals make an attractive holiday decoration for all forms of mail matter.
