1803 ACRES OF SPUDS INSPECTED FOR SEED

As a result of careful inspections of 1803 acres of seed potatoes in New York State this past season by specialists of the State College of Agriculture, high quality stock will be widely available for planting next spring. The college does not assume any responsibility for seed sold from the plantings which its specialists have inspected.

The seed potatoes are sold by various commercial and co-operative concerns, which alone are responsible for any certification given.

The college is, however, glad to furnish any interested persons information regarding the inspection of any fields which it has examined.

Among the varieties of inspected potatoes available, sources of which may be learned from the college or from the county agent, are, Green Mountain, American Giant, No. 9, Heavyweight, Rural Russet, Rural New Yorker No. 2, Sir Walter Raleigh Spaulding Rose 4, Irish Cobbler, Bliss Triumph, and Early Ohio.

CREMATE BUG PESTS IN PILES OF TRASH

Burning up the garden trash and weed piles in the late fall or early spring is advocated by the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca as an excellent means of getting rid of many insect pests which ordinarily live over the winter in such hiding places.

Potato stalks, squash and cucumber vines, tomato stalks, leaves, spargus tops, cabbage leaves, bean and pea vines and the like furnish shelter during the winter for bugs, aphids, eggs, squash bugs, striped cucumber beetles, and many fungi-causing plant diseases which could be destroyed by burning their lurking places.

The clean-up should include flower gardens as well as vegetable gardens. The dead tops of flowering plants should be piled together and burned along with the other rubbish and trash.
