Chicago potato market down 10c-15c for the week. Other markets nearly steady. Prices slightly weaker at shipping points. Cabbage higher. New York Danish type stock firm New York and Baltimore, up \$10-13 in other markets, up \$3 at shipping points. Onions up 25c-75c per 100 lbs. in city markets. Apple markets steady to firm. Prices reported Dec. 4th: New York and Penna. Round White potatoes bulk and sacked, mostly \$1.21-\$1.35 per 100 lbs., reaching \$1.40 in New York City, 90c f. o. b. Rochester and nearby points. Maine Green Mountain \$1.25-\$1.45 in New York and Boston. Northern stock 70-85c in Chicago, 80c-\$1.10 in other markets. New York Danish type cabbage \$20-30 per ton bulk in city markets, \$13-16 f. o. b. shipping points. Northern Danish steady in Chicago at \$15-16. Middwestern Yellow onions \$2-\$2.90 per 100 lb. sack in city markets; eastern Yellow Globes \$1.75-\$2.50. New York Baldwin Apples, \$3-\$4.75 per bbl. in-leading markets, \$3.35-4 f. o. b. shipping points. New York and Michigan Rhode Island Greenings \$4.50-5 in city markets. Middwestern Jonathans \$5.50-6 in Chicago. Northwestern extra fancy boxed Jonathans \$1.75-2.25 in most markets, \$2.25-2.50 in Kansas City.

In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets slight changes in prices were registered for the week. Beef and veal were steady on better grades and weak to \$1 higher on cheaper grades; lamb and pork loins weak to \$1 lower with mutton \$1 lower to \$1 higher on good grade and steady on other grades. On Dec. 4 beef, veal, lamb and mutton generally steady to \$1 higher; pork about steady to Phila. light and medium weight loins steady to \$1 higher with other cuts weak to \$1 lower at New York and \$1-2 lower at Boston. Dec. 4 prices good grade meats: Beef \$14-14; veal \$14-18; lamb \$23-28; mutton \$11-18; light pork loins \$17-19; heavy loins \$15-17.

Alfred University

(Pres. Club)

Alfred University celebrated the 87th anniversary of the founding of the school by a fitting special assembly.

President Lent, of Elmira College, the oldest women's college in the world, gave one of the best Founder's Day addresses ever heard in the history of the school. His talk on "The Relation of Education to Success" was exceptional.

The institution was founded as the "Alfred Academy and Teacher's Seminary, a non-sectarian institution" in 1835. Under the administration of the "famous faculty of seven" who agreed to work for \$400 a year for five years to firmly establish the institution co-education was begun. In 1857 the university charter was granted. For thirty years the university grew, but slowly. Then it took a spurt, due to the addition of

new buildings, increased equipment and advantages. In 1900 the School of Clay-Working and Ceramics was founded, making the institution a stronger university. In 1908 the School of Agriculture was formed adding a third part to the institution. The university is now looking forward to a greater Alfred. A new chemistry laboratory building is under construction and will soon be occupied. Next spring work will be begun on a new gymnasium and athletic field. Soon after a new assembly hall will be erected. These are a part of a plan for the expansion of the next twenty-five years.
