PLAN TO RID ALLEGANY DAIRIES OF TUBERCULOSIS

State and Federal Departments Co-operating. The State and Federal Departments of Agriculture have been co-operating with Allegany County Farm Bureau since May, 1921, in employing a veterinary on full time to test Allegany County dairies for bovine tuberculosis. During this time about 7500 animals have been tested with only 529 reactors, making an especially low percentage. But with over 50,000 dairy cattle in the county it is an endless task for one veterinarian. Because of the fine progress made in this county and because of the very low percentage of infected animals the departments have indicated a willingness to furnish additional assistance so as to make a complete test of all cattle in the county in one year if funds can be provided locally to carry on the work. There are many reasons why this is a very valuable project to undertake. A few of these are: 1. To eradicate all Tubercular cattle in the county. 2. The healthy cattle will have an increased sale value. 3. Tuberculosis is communicable. 4. Deceased cattle are not economic producers. 5. All cattle must be tested for interstate sale. 6. All good cattle are now bought subject to test. 7. To remove a possible cause of human tuberculosis. 8. There is a demand for tested cattle. We have an opportunity, make it general! If the campaign against tuberculosis is to be complete it must consider doing away with the causes. If there is even a possibility that bovine tuberculosis is contractable by human beings there should be no time lost in removing this cause. If the citizens of Allegany County have any doubt in their minds as to this possibility can they afford to postpone the present opportunity?
