TWO FACTORS IN BUYING FEED, SAYS SAVAGE

In buying feed, the brand of the market and the comparative cost per hundred of digestible nutrients in a balanced ration are the two chief factors to be considered by dairymen. These facts are brought out in a table prepared by Professor E. S. Savage of the N. Y. S. College of Agriculture published in a recent issue of the Dairymen's League News.

If this table Professor Savage shows that the cost a hundred pounds of digestible nutrients in the various ingredients used to make up a balanced ration for dairy cows varies widely. Based on wholesale prices prevailing in the Utica freight rate territory on November 24th, a hundred pounds of digestible nutrients cost 2.11 in corn feed meal and \$3.06 in 43% cotton seed meal.

"Dairy feed should be bought with the object of securing a balanced ration at the least cost per hundred pounds of digestible nutrients," says Professor Savage. To do this successfully requires the utmost care in selecting the ingredients for the ration and a careful study of market conditions. Combined into a balanced ration, the present cost of a hundred pounds of digestible nutrients as shown in Professor Savage's table is at least 65c a hundred pounds higher than prices for the same rations in the early fall.

SUGGEST DECEMBER RATIONS FOR DAIRY

Here is Recommended Mixture for Cows Given Corn Silage and Mixed Hay Containing Clover

The December Dairy ration, suggested by the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca for cows being fed consisting of corn silage and mixed hay containing at least half clover, is as follows: 600 pounds wheat bran; 400 pounds hominy feed; 600 pounds gluten feed; 200 pounds cottonseed meal 43 per cent; 200 pounds linseed oil meal. Wholesale price per ton; \$41.28. Approximate analysis: Protein 21 per cent, fibre 9 per cent; fat 5 per cent.

Ground oats are omitted from this mixture, the college says, because of their relatively high cost. However, the farmer with plenty of home grown oats could improve it slightly by using 200 pounds of oats in place of an equal amount of wheat bran. Ground buckwheat could also be substituted for a part of the bran.

The hominy feed might be replaced by corn meal, corn feed meal or ground barley with equally good results. In place of part or all of the gluten feed, buckwheat middlings could be used. The college says this is a good dairy feed and can often be purchased to advantage at this time of year.

The following grain mixture is suggested as suitable for both young stock and dry cows: 800 pounds wheat bran; 800 pounds hominy feed; 400 pounds oil meal. Wholesale price per ton, \$37.92. Approximate analysis: Protein 18 per cent, fibre 9 per cent, fat 5.5 per cent.
