Farm and Stock Mart

(Washington, D. C., for week ending Dec. 18, 1922.)

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices ranged from 15-25c lower for the week. Beef steers were from 25-40c lower; butchers heifers 25-65c lower with butchers cows from 25c lower to 35c higher. Feeders ranged from 15-25c lower and veal calves from steady to 25c higher. Fat lambs were 10-25c lower, feeders steady to 25c higher and yearlings 25-50c lower. On Dec. 18 hogs closed dull; beef steers and butchers cows and heifers strong to 15c higher, calves and stockers and feeders mostly steady with fat lambs 25-35c lower. Dec. 18 Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$8.35; bulk of sale \$8-\$8.25; medium and good beef steers \$7.50-\$11.50; butchers cows and heifers \$3.63-\$10.50; feeder steers \$5.35-\$7.75; light and medium weight veal calves \$8.50-10; fat lambs \$13-15.40; feeding lambs \$12.75-14.75; yearlings \$9-13; fat cows \$4.75-7.75.

Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending Dec. 8th were: Cattle and calves 92,989; hogs 19,909; sheep 66,798. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets lower grade beef and good veal were \$1 higher than a week ago with other grades steady. Better grades of lamb and light pork cuts were \$1 lower with heavy loins from 50c higher to \$1 lower. All grades of mutton were practically steady. On Dec. 18 beef was \$1 higher at Boston and steady at other markets. Veal and mutton remained steady at all markets, with lamb steady at Boston, weak at New York and \$1 higher at Phila. Pork loins were 50c-\$1 higher at New York and steady at other markets. Dec. 18th prices good grade meats: Beef \$15-17; veal \$15-19; lamb \$23-27; mutton \$11-17; light pork loins \$15-17; heavy loins \$12.50-15.00.

Fruits and Vegetables

Potato markets steady to firm in East for the week; up 25c in Chicago; up 10c f. o. b. New York points. Cabbage markets irregular, down \$1 principal shipping points. Onions continue to advance. Apple markets steady to firm. Prices reported Dec. 18: New York and Penna. sacked Round White and Maine Green Mountains potatoes \$1.30-1.50 per 100 lbs. in city markets. New York sacked stock 95c-\$1.05 f. o. b. shipping points. Northern Round Whites, sacked and bulk, 90c-\$1.10 in Chicago, 95c-\$1.10 in other markets, 50c-65c f. o. b. Growers in Colorado receiving 30c for rurals. New York and Northern Danish type cabbage \$20-30 per ton bulk in leading markets.

Grain prices trended upward during the week and closed at high points. Chicago May wheat up 5c; Chicago May corn up 4%. Advance in foreign exchange, good export business, and improved milling inquiry were main market factors. Wheat strong on the 18th, selling at new high price on crop, all deliveries.
