OF INTEREST TO FARMERS

GET SEED CORN SOON SAY PLANT BREEDERS

Advice From State College of Agriculture is to Buy Seed of Sources as Soon as Possible.

A fair supply of good seed corn was harvested in central Pennsylvania during the first week in November, says Prof. F. P. Bussell, of the state college of agriculture at Ithaca.

The fall was favorable to the ripening of seed corn and the prospects for a good supply of seed improved materially after the first part of October, when it was feared that there would be a repetition of the seed scarcity of the previous year.

He accordingly urges that corn growers make sure of their seed sources soon, or definitely place their orders with some one who they know can care for their needs.

The past two seasons have been hard on the farmer who waited till the last minute to get his seed corn, and Prof. Bussell says that the department of plant breeding of the state college at Ithaca will be glad to help any farmers find seed sources if he is unable to find them himself, or if his county agent is unable to give him information as to possible sources.

ESSEX-COUNTY COW IN LEAD FOR FAT HONORS

"Vally" Stands First in Dairy Improvement Association Reports; Has Good Lead Over Next Contender.

A recent report of G. W. Talley, Jr., supervisor of the state dairy improvement associations, shows that W. W. Fortune, of Essex, again leads the list of the five high cows for butterfat in New York state. His "Vally" produced 67.4 pounds of fat during the month.

L. Anson, of Clinton, placed fourth with "Red Bell Babel," whose 62.7 pounds of fat were taken from 1,959.2 pounds of milk, the highest milk production of any of the five high cows. "Va Fairy Girl," owned by O. E. Cross, of Niobe was the fifth in the list, with a production of 61.5 pounds.

The group this month was fairly close, and this shows, say the dairymen at the state college of agriculture, that the dairy improvement associations thru the state really accomplish what they originally set out to do.

STUDY COURSE STUDENTS SEND IN 5,066 REPORTS

Correspondence Lessons in Ten Branches of Farming by State College of Agriculture.

Instructors of the state college of agriculture at Ithaca received 5,066 written reports from the 920 New York farmers who have taken agricultural correspondence courses during the past year.

Those who take these courses buy their own text books, read definite assignments in them and in bulletins furnished by the college, and after putting what is read into practice on the farm, send in reports of their experiences.

Many of the suggestions made to correspondence students are the result of the experience of other farmers taking courses as well as of the research of the college.

The average number of reports received varied from 19.5 for farm management students to 9.4 from those taking the course in pork production.
