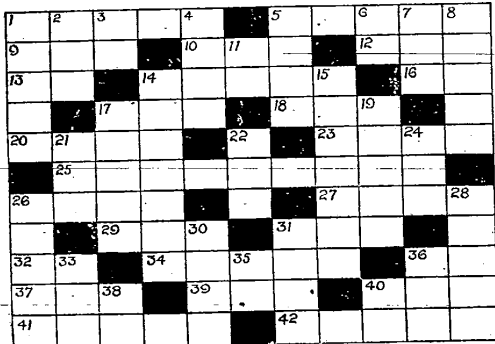
WHAT'S THE REAL QUESTION?

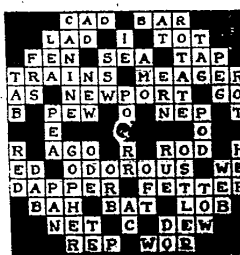

Be Sure You Report

Parties desiring to cross the line into Canada, whether walking or riding, are now supposed to report at the Immigration Office.

TABLET UNVEILED

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Jan. 5.—There was unveiled here at noon today a tablet of enduring bronze to mark the location of the first large scale development of Niagara power.

In this dignified and lasting manner the Niagara Falls Power company expresses its appreciation of the engineers, financiers and scientists whose genius, courage and industry brot into being a service destined in ever increasing fashion to benefit millions of people.

It is fitting that this tablet should be erected at the portal entrance to Power House No. 1, wherein were installed thirty years ago the world's first 5,000 horsepower water turbines directly connected to alternating current generators. Equally appropriate is the time of unveiling this tribute to the Niagara power pioneers, for it marks the completion of the latest Niagara power project on the American side of the river. In this new power house again we find the world's largest turbines—three gigantic water wheels, each capable of delivering in excess of 70,000 horsepower. Thirty years ago the engineering and scientific world wondered where and how the 15,000 available horsepower of Niagara's energy could ever be utilized.

Today the American generating system constitutes a pool of power from which western and central New York draws nearly a half million continuous horsepower of electrical energy to lighten labor in the home, the shop and in the factory.

Notification was sent to the postmaster at Richmond, Va., that a newspaper there offering prizes should be deprived of the mailing privilege. Postal officials point out that the element of chance enters into such an award of prizes.

Aunt Ada's Axioms: Your own living room is the real center of the world.

When grinding bread for poultry stuffing, a paper bag tied over the grinder helps catch the crumbs.

Carrot and orange marmalade is loaded to the gunwales with vitamins and hardly stays in glasses long enough to pay to cover with paraffin.

Ink may be removed from upholstery by covering the spot with a paste made of baking soda and water. When thoroughly dry, it should be brushed off. This may be repeated if necessary.

The first of the year is an excellent time for making a budget. The state college of agriculture at Ithaca has a bulletin, H 124, which is free to all who will write the college and ask for it by number.

A few drops of commercial ammonia on a dry cloth will do much to remove "water spots" from polished floors or furniture. If the surface is waxed the spots should be rubbed with a mixture of equal parts of turpentine and linseed oil.
