—Lew Wallace of Bolivar had the index fingers on both hands amputated last week. Wallace was putting a new leaf in the springs of his automobile when the jack slipped, letting the weight of the car on his fingers, crushing them.

—W. B. Turner of Nile, formerly of Bolivar, has sold at a private consideration, his oil property on the George Burdick farm, town of Wirt, to the A. C. A. Oil Company, Inc., composed of E. W. Cady and F. T. Allen of Bolivar and Max Andrews of Olean. The property consists of eight producing wells, doing about two barrels a day; one power and other equipment. There are 490 acres in fee, it being 1,200 foot drilling. The Richburg sand is about 25 feet in depth.

—Mrs. Elizabeth Hann, W. R. C. chairman of Relief Work, has received a letter of appreciation from the superintendent of Oxford Home for the barrel of canned fruit recently sent them from Edward Seaman Relief Corps. 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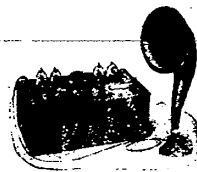
