

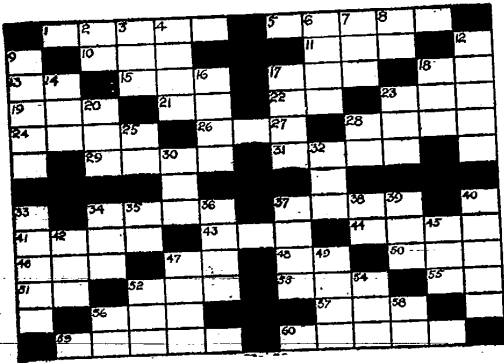
THIS WEEK'S CROSS WORD PUZZLE

Veal Calves Lower

Country dressed calves declined two cents a pound on Tuesday as a result of more liberal arrivals and only a normal demand.

Hay Barely Steady; Demand is For Top Grades

The hay market closed barely steady, with moderate receipts and a slow demand except for the top grades.

Fruits and Vegetables

Eastern potatoes generally higher; northern stock nearly steady in city markets; irregular at shipping points.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices ranged from 35-45c higher than a week ago, closing at \$11.50 for the top and \$10.70-\$11.15 for the bulk.

Dairy Products

Butter markets were irregular and unsettled during the week ending February 9.

Feed

Demand for feedstuffs slow. Offerings liberal both by mills and refiners, especially the latter as they are pressed for shipping instructions.

Grain

May grain market nervous and fluctuating. Wheat futures about 8-9c lower than week ago.

Hay

Hay market slightly firmer. Lower prices together with bad roads in some sections reducing arrivals.

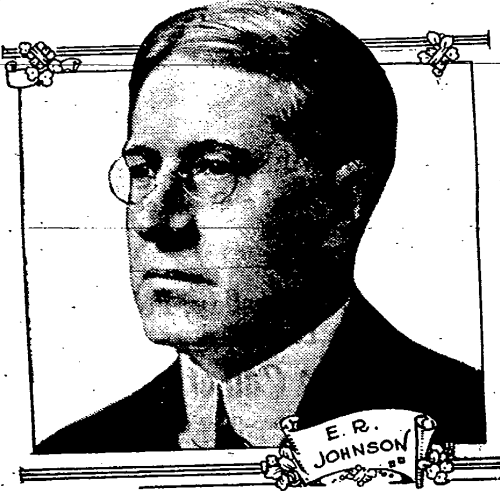
