—Eleanor Green entertained eight young friends Wednesday afternoon at her home on Barney street, in honor of her eighth birthday.

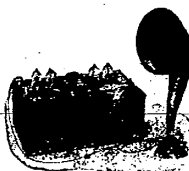
—Mrs. Edith Holmes is unable to be at her place in the post office on account of illness. Mrs. Edward Teasdale is working in her place.
