Federal Officers Active in County

Wellsville, March 24.—Gilbert Gordon of Wellsville was arrested this morning by Deputy U. S. Marshal Harry Donovan on a warrant charging violation of the national prohibition law. Gordon, who is a painter, is alleged to have sold a half pint of alleged white spirits to Lloyd Morrison and another man on March 19. He was held in \$2,000 bail. George DeBarberi, also of Wellsville, was served with a federal warrant and ordered to appear before Commissioner Colin McLennan this afternoon. He is charged with possession and sale. He was held in \$2,000 bail. Commissioner McLennan refused to discharge William Klatt of Black Creek, near Cuba, this afternoon. After a final hearing he held Klatt in \$1,000 bail for a federal grand jury. Attorney Harry L. Allen, appearing for Klatt, moved to discharge Klatt on the ground that Constable Ira Easton had no authority to arrest or search Klatt's car. Constable Easton testified that he observed two bottles in Klatt's roadster as it was parked in a Cuba garage. He went out and arrested Klatt. Attorney Allen suggested that it would be ridiculous for a bootlegger, as he said the government alleged Klatt to be, to be transporting whiskey and leaving it in a garage when he parked his car. Commissioner McLennan said: "Your argument is all right in Hornell, where they don't do those things, but in Cuba, things are more free." An analysis of the alleged whiskey found in the bottles, which Constable Easton said he removed from Klatt's car, has been made and the result was read into the record taker. This showed that the alleged whiskey is 39.50 per cent. alcohol. During the hearing it developed that Oliver Cleghorn, a material witness held in \$500 bail, had been sent to Monroe county penitentiary for 60 days. At a previous hearing Constable Easton, facing Cleghorn, told him that he was telling a different story than he told the officer in Cuba. Constable Easton swore that Cleghorn agreed to tell where Klatt got the alleged whiskey in Olean if Cleghorn was let off on a charge of stealing four automobile tires.
