

Matthias Nicoll, Jr., M. D., State Commission of Health:

"I believe that a man gets what he goes after, that one deed done to day is worth two deeds tomorrow, and that no man is down and out until he has lost faith in himself.

"I believe in today and the work I am doing, in tomorrow and the work I hope to do, and in the sure reward which the future holds.

"In New York State all parent and others having the care of child-ren are urged to take stock of health conditions during this month. Healthy childhood is an asset, not to the child or to the family alone, but to the state and nation. This was proven at the time of the World War when one out of every four or five of our drafted young men were found to be physicially unfit to serve their country. petition.

"I believe there is something doing, somewhere, for every man ready to do it.

"I believe I am ready—Right now?"

The foregoing is a creed which will prove healthful to your mental state.

"On thoro examination only aboufour or five out of every one hun-dred children are found to be ab-solutely normal. About two out of every hundred have from ten to fifteen physical defects each.

"Theodore Roosevelt was able to be governor of our state and president of our nation because his parents gave him thotful care during the early years of his childhood and because the lessons taught by his parents were later practical in the development and maintenance of his health.

New York State. Every one has an equal right to health and happiness. Parents should have a physician take stock of the health of these children at least twice a year and should see that they are well trained in the observance of simple health rules. Give thought to this on May Day. Let New York State lead in healthy children as it does in so many other important ways."

This is a proclamation meriting state wide publicity. It deserves deep, thoughtful consideration.
