PAY DIRT

Tell me, you who spade the earth, What is all your labor worth? Tell me little garden pot, Do you pay or do you not?

Is the home garden solvent? Does it pay, not only in health and satisfaction, but in dollars and cents? One state experiment station tried it out. That was in Missouri because the people there have to be shown. Records were kept for three years on two plots—one a twentieth of an acre, the other a quarter of an acre. The average net profit on the smaller plot was \$47.38. The rows were close together and cultivation was done by hand. The net annual return from the larger plot averaged \$134.14. Rows were widely spaced on this plot and horse tools were used for cultivation. Notice that these figures are net. All possible charges against the garden, such as seed, fertilizer, labor, rent of ground and so forth have been deducted.


