**Notice of Change in Tapping Regulations, Water Department, of Andover.**

At a regular meeting of the Water Commissioners of the Village of Andover, N. Y., held Thursday evening, May 7th, it was unanimously voted to change the water rules and regulations to water consumers wishing to tap the water mains, so that instead of just simply paying the cost of the job, as previously, in the future the charge will be a fixed charge of \$15.00. The work always to be done in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Water Department.

Permits will be issued to property owners desiring to tap the water mains, by the Village Treasurer, instead of the Village Clerk, upon payment of the \$15 fee.
