—The Goodrich and Coats oil property on the Frank McDermott farm in Bolivar, consisting of 20 acres in fee and nine producing wells has been sold to Olean parties.

—The defeated side entertained the winners of the seasons' contest in the Five Hundred Club, at a seven o'clock dinner at the Murray Tea Room in Wellsville, Thursday evening.

—The first carload of furniture was shipped from the Friendship Furniture plant last week. About 40 men are now employed and more are being put on regularly.—Register.

Below is a copy of a letter which the principals of high schools throughout the state received from the State Department of Education early this week. It will be noted that schools are not to take advantage of this unusual condition which now exists and claim more than their usual (or average) percentage of pupils in elementary algebra. Andover High School for the last three and one-half years, has claimed approximately two-thirds of her elementary algebra students.

Following this average, we are entitled this year to claim two-thirds of the twenty-two in the class. Ten passed the examination as set. The addition of the five or six highest averages for the year makes up the list.

To the Principal:  
 The content of the June 1925, examination in elementary algebra does not differ from previous tests, but a simpler mechanical arrangement of the paper was provided, with the thought that it could be rated more quickly by teachers and by Department examiners than previous papers in the subject. The committee which made the paper and the majority of the committee of revision approved of the paper in the form presented, but the examination itself appears to have confused many pupils and to have affected thereby the examination result.

In order then that this experiment may not work an injustice to these pupils, it has been determined to accept the papers of all pupils whose school rating in the subject has been satisfactory throughout the year.

Therefore, in the principal's report under the column entitled Elementary Algebra, please set opposite the name of each pupil for whom you claim credit in this subject the letter "P." This will indicate that in your judgment the pupil is entitled to a passing grade in the subject.

The papers in elementary algebra need not be forwarded to this Department, but must be retained in the school, subject to call, for at least one year. Wherever an actual per cent. may be necessary for college certification or for any other purpose, the papers in elementary algebra of the pupils concerned will be called in and rated in this Department. It should be noted that any appreciable increase in a given school in the number of pupils claimed to have passed elementary algebra over previous records in that subject may make it necessary to call in these papers from that school.

Please submit all papers in intermediate and in advanced algebra which have been rated by your teachers at sixty per cent. or above.

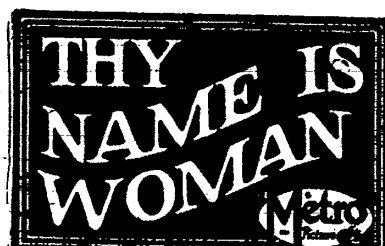
