HIGHLIGHTS ON STATE CROPS

From New York State Dept. Farms and Markets June 23, 1925.

Currents and Gooseberries Drag. Strawberries Active.

Hudson Valley currents and gooseberries dragged badly on Tuesday, says the State Department of Farms & Markets.

Currents and gooseberries met a quick sale, as few such were available.

The supply of cherries was more plentiful, and prices averaged lower, especially for red sours and the ordinary or small of the sweet varieties.

Receipts of celery have been fairly liberal and trading moderate.

Bunches have jobbed out lately at 65c-1.25, and three-quarters crates of rough at \$6.50-7.50.

Letture from Orange county continues to be trucked in liberal supply but most of the stock is still leafy and burnt.

Fancy lettuce on Tuesday sold well at \$1.50-1.75; occasional \$2 per crate.

Milk receipts were steady at 28-29c a pound, leghorn fowls, of which many were poor, at 20-26c.

Colored broilers closed at 40-42c, leghorn broilers at 30-36c.

Butter and Cheese Steady, Eggs Higher.

The butter market is steady with creamery salted 92 score at 42½c a pound.

Fresh egg prices have advanced with the result that nearby hennery white average extras are selling at 41-43c a dozen.

Cheese is steady. Average run, whole milk flats closed at 25½-26½c a pound for held and at 21½c for fresh.

Hay Receipts Light, Market Firm

Hay receipts are light and the market firm. U. S. Timothy No. 1 closed at \$25 a ton; No. 2 at \$22-23; No. 3 at \$18-20; Sample at \$10-17.
