#### DOGS

All Dog Licenses Expire on June 30. The 1925 License Fee is Due July 1st.

Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without a tag is presumptive evidence by law, and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed, and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

Dog licenses must be obtained from the Clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License Fees are as follows: Male dog \$2.25 Female dog 5.25 Spayed female dog 2.25 These amounts include clerk's fees.

No license can be issued for less than the full license fee.

The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The assessors of towns and the police departments of cities are required to prepare in June of each year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of the owner from the assessors' or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license.

Clark and Hattie Clark, his wife, for Thirty-five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00), and issue and sell bonds for that amount, bearing interest, upon the faith and credit of said District, payable in seven equal annual installments, and pursuant to the action and resolutions of said Board of Education,
