Weather Conditions The Past Week

Summary of Weather and Crop Conditions in New York State

(Week ending July 14, 1925)

The week averaged slightly warmer than the normal and sunshine was adequate over most sections. Light to heavy rains occurred the first half of the week, which delayed haying and the cultivation of crops.

Most all crops made good growth during the week. Early sown wheat is about ready to harvest and some rye has been cut. Some hay was damaged by the heavy rains that occurred on the 10th; pastures are holding out fairly well.

Apples are developing quite rapidly; the apple and pear crop will be about normal, although there is a wide variation over the state, some orchards are very light and others are good.
