The new owners have taken possession of the lease and will at once start a flood and drill several additional oil wells.

—The well located by H. F. Colister on his farm and drilled in this week by the Penn Yan Oil company, is making about two and one-half barrels per day. The company has decided to drill the well deeper. Yesterday a strong flow of gas was encountered at 1,126 feet. The flow is estimated at 75,000 to 100,000 feet daily. This makes the field rather more promising.—Fillmore Observer.
