High School and Rural Unite

At a recent election it was voted to form a central rural school district, comprising the union free school district of Friendship, six rural school districts in the town of Friendship, rural school district No. 7 of the town of Cuba and district No. 7 of the town of Wirt. The last session of the state legislature passed an act permitting the formation of such central rural districts and providing special state aid. This includes an allowance of 25 per cent. of the cost of new buildings and one-half of the cost of transportation of pupils from rural sections to the central school.

Healthographs

The physicians of Andover are in a position to afford you the highest possible protection from diphtheria.

The treatment consists of three injections, seven days apart.

Children from six months, thru school ages should thus be treated.

The younger the child the less likelihood of any reaction from this treatment.

A conservative estimate is that the protection lasts five years.

With public co-operation there will be no diphtheria in 1930.

Material for such treatment is on hand at this office.

Consent slips for the treatment must be signed by a parent or guardian.

Upon conclusion of the immunization a certificate is issued showing that your child has received such protection.
