## Notice to Cut Weeds

This is to notify you that section 54 of the Highway Law requires that the owner or occupant of lands abutting upon the highway shall, before the first day of September in each year, cut and remove all noxious weeds, briars and brush growing within the bounds of the highway fronting such premises. If the owner or occupant fails to perform this duty, Section 54 and 55 of the Highway Law requires the Town Superintendent to cut and remove the same during the month of September and assess the cost as a tax against the property. The Town Superintendent of your town is held strictly accountable to the department for the enforcement of the law in this respect.
