

### Compulsory Education Law is no Small Matte

Every pupil between seven and fourteen years of age, who is physically able, shall attend school every day that school is in session.

Every pupil between 14 and 16 years of age, who is physically able, shall attend school every day that school is in session, unless regularly and lawfully empoyed.

For violating the Compulsory Education law a parent or guardian may be fined \$5 for the first offense and \$50 and forty days in jail for any subsequent offense. A person or firm employing a child illegally may be fined \$50.
