Public water supplies should insure safety for drinking purposes.

So do private supplies when it is a fact that there is no possibility of contamination.

Unfortunately, clear, running water may be easily, unexpectedly and very dangerously polluted.

Springs and wells produce a safe supply of water if so located as to be free from possible pollution.

One hundred feet is a conservative estimate for the distance of a private supply should be from any suspicious source of contamination.

Springs for human consumption should be protected from usage by animals.

Wells ought to be lined with stone or brick.

Deep driven wells, are, of course, safer than the shallow-dug type.

Wells should be tightly covered and all surface waters should be warded off.

Natural ice is safer than artificial ice, under normal conditions.

Actually, however, the danger from artificial ice is very slight.
