"Now it came to pass in those days, there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus that all the (Roman) world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, made when Quirinius was governing Syria. And all went to enroll themselves, everyone to his own And Joseph also went up * * * to enroll himself with Mary, his wife * * *"




