This manifested itself especially in the war in the Riff maintained against France and Spain throughout the year by Abd-el-Krim, and in the rebellion against the French regime in Syria. The latter was primarily carried on by the Druses, nonmoslem tribesmen, but the Mohammedan Arabs took at times an active part in it. 

Wellsville, Dec. 30.-State troopers raided the road house between Wellsville and Andover, a mile west of Elm Valley, last night.

The house is just at the foot of a hill, and the property was formerly known as the Deer Lick Spring Farm, but has lately changed owners and, according to rumor, has been running wide open as a sporting house for some time, wearing the euphonious title of "The Greasy Spoon."

When Sergeant Burnett of Canisteo, accompanied by two state troopers, gained admission to the house, shortly after 11 o'clock last night, they found three women and three men, also a little girl ten years old. All were placed under arrest and brought to Welsville, where they were taken before Justice of the Peace Norton York, for a midnight court session.
