INFLUENZA THREATENS State Health Commissioner Issues Warning-Disease May Prove

Similar to Epidemic of 1918 The State Health Commissioner of New York has issued a vigorous warning, urging the importance of careful handling o. epidemic influenza, which has made its appearance in several sections of New York State recently. While the disease is not known to be of the virulent form which prevailed during the 1918 epidemic, reports from a number of counties indicate that it is

decidedly serious. The official report says: "The duration of most of the cases is limited to three days, but there is a marked tendency to relapse, especially in individuals who get up too soon. Some of the adult cases have commenced with severe nausea and vomiting. All the cases seem to be followed by prostration. The disease is highly communicable and in some households all the members have come down within a day or two of one another."


