

Why Electricity Costs Less

Electric current is one of the very few exceptions to the rule that everything costs more than it did ten years ago.

There are two important reasons for this remarkable fact. First, an enormous development of economical water power resources. Second, the great progress in electrical engineering methods and machinery, as applied to both generating and transmitting power.

The chart above shows the facts for the United States as a whole. The comparative showing would be even more favorable for central and western New York because the Niagara Falls Power Company sells its electricity at the lowest average rate received by any generating system on the North American Continent.
