

TITHETHER the truth is a defense in contempt V court cases is a question that has been raised ndiana thru the affirming of the decision of a circuit court in the case of George Dae, Muncie, Indiana editor, by the Indiana supreme court. Dale is without funds to prosecute the case farther, but the friends of [] a free press have come to his assistance and are raising the money to provide an appeal bond. A writ of error has been granted, which is the first step in takling the case to the United States supreme court.

Dale was cited for contempt for articles appearing his newspaper criticizing the grand jury and local court after he was indicted on charges of possessio making, transporting and bartering alcoholic He asserted that the charges were trumped up and this later proved to be true because prosecution of the cases against him were dropped. The Indiana supreme court upheld the lower court in a decision which in substance was that the "truth is no defense."

The issue has challenged wide attention. Whether the process of justice was obstructed does not seem to ! be the question involved. It is easy to conceive of instances where even the truth might be harmful, under certain circumstances, in making public charges against judges. But even then common sense revolts against lany such a suggestion.

Newspapers are slow to criticize judges or judicial decisions. They as a rule are zealous in their protection of the courts, representatives of the law. Rarely! s a newspaper editor cited for contempt. He stood on the street corner and uttered large opinions as if he settled the problems of the world. It was growing late and he put the quietus on a discussion with the ponderous statement:


