Blinker Is Installed

The overhead blinker, purchased by the village some time ago for erection at the corner of Main street and the Bolivar road has been installed by the water and light department.

The light can be seen from four sides and should provide protection for this dangerous intersection. The corner has been the scene of more accidents than any other in Wellsville. Considerable property damage has resulted from the accidents when motorists unable to make this sharp corner have continued across the lawn of Bayard Haskins.

The light has the approval of the state highway department. Recently it was voted by the village to erect a pedestal blinker. This type of signal was not approved by the state.

Asks Pastor's Return

An invitation for the return of the Rev. T. Garland Smith as pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Wellsville was extended at a conference meeting following the Thursday evening prayer meeting last week. The conference was presided over by Dr. Leffler, superintendent of the Olean district.

The invitation will be carried to the annual conference to be held in Bradford, Pa., commencing September 22nd. Allen Corwin was elected delegate to the lay electoral conference. Bayard Haskins was named reserve delegate. Reports of the heads of all departments in the church were read at the conference and showed the local church to be in a healthy condition.

Marcis Purchases I. O. O. F. Building

James Marcis, proprietor of the Temple theatre, has purchased the Odd Fellows building at 28 West Genesee street, it was announced Monday. The local lodge, however, has obtained a ten-year lease on the lodge rooms and will continue to hold their meetings there.

The deal has been pending for some time and was completed Friday. The theatre is located in the building. It is expected the new owner will make a few changes.

Olean Contractor Fined On Bad Check Charge

George A. Smith, 47, of Olean, a contractor, received a three months' suspended sentence and was fined \$5 by Police Justice P. L. O'Connor Saturday when he pled guilty to a charge of petit larceny in connection with a bad check charge.

E. W. Stone, Wellsville, who had been employed by Smith as a laborer, was the complainant in the case. He was hired by Smith on a sidewalk construction job and was given a "rubber" check for \$18.50 in payment.

Smith was given 30 days in which to make restitution. In all, it will cost him \$40, including the \$18.50 check, another \$14, costs amounting to \$2.50 and the \$5 fine.

He was arrested by Policeman Eric Roeske on a warrant.

First Offender

Eldyn P. Boyd, 24, of this place paid \$2 Friday for the distinction of being the first person to violate the new village ordinance pertaining to stopping for thru streets. Boyd was arrested by Policeman Eric Roeske and charged with violation of Chapter 1, Section 12 of the village ordinances. He pled guilty to the charge and was fined \$2 by Police Justice P. L. O'Connor.

Firemen to Parade

Invitations were sent out Saturday to five neighboring volunteer fire departments to join with the Wellsville companies in participation of the annual inspection parade of firemen here Thursday night, September 17th. The five departments invited are Bolivar, Belmont, Richburg, Andover and Scio.

The invitations for the parade and official review by Mayor T. J. Egan, and members of the village board of trustees, is for the purpose of creating a better feeling of understanding between the fire boys in this immediate vicinity. Should the invitations be accepted the parade should be an imposing one. According to present plans the parade will lead thru Main street and terminate at the Wellsville fair grounds where the first Community Fair will be in progress. The companies will be reviewed by the village officials from the grandstand in the fair grounds.
