The Martyr's Shrine is erected on the grounds surrounding old Fort St. Marie which was built about 1640, and was one of the first centers of civilization and Christianity in the Province of Ontario.

Midland has wonderful natural endowments, on the opposite side of the town from the harbor is a beautiful clear water lake, with shallow beaches for bathing and finely adapted to all water sports.

Along the north shore of this lake is Midland's motor camp, picnic grounds, children's play grounds athletic field and race track. All owned and operated by the municipality; every convenience and comfort are provided for the camper, visitor or resident and all within less than one mile from the main business center. All thru the picnic grounds are located tables, stoves, with fuel handy, water faucets and electric lights, while in the central building an abundance of boiling water is always available. The only place on the grounds where any charge is made is a small fee for a tent location in the motor camp.

The week-end before our arrival there were more than 500 tents and over 2,000 people registered in this motor camp.

Except for the athletic field and a strip along the lake shore, the park is well wooded with large trees of maple, oak, beech and birch. They have been trimmed and cared for until they give a perfect shade over the whole area, all brush and undergrowth has been removed and park attendants keep the whole place scrupulously clean. The tradesmen of Midland say that as a business proposition it compares favorably with their largest industry.

This section is truly a great summer play ground; thousands of summer cottages, many fine beach resorts, the pure bracing air, absence of mosquitoes or other pests, and the friendliness of the inhabitants all combine to render it a most attractive, healthful and satisfying locality.
