The roads to this north country have now been improved until there is but 60 miles of unpaved highway between Toronto and North Bay, and less than 15 miles, but that has been swamped, ditched and gravelled so that travel all the way is safe and quite comfortable.

Ten years ago motoring on north from North Bay was impossible, now there is a very passable motor highway to Kapuskasing, 350 miles north from North Bay and Cochrane, 276 miles from North Bay is only 140 miles from James Bay; this highway passes thru the developed mineral area of North Ontario and makes accessible by motor the towns of Cobalt, Gowganda, Kirkland Lake, Timmins, Porcupine and many other places of less importance that have contributed to the mineral wealth of this area.

No observation of the natural resources of this section would be fair or representative that did not include the forests and lumbering industry. They provide most of the occupation and have contributed more largely to the wealth than any one or possibly all of its other activities, just now this industry is passing thru one of the most trying times in its history. It is very difficult to limit production and there has been so little demand that a large part of all the lumber that has passed the saws during the past three seasons is piled in the yard awaiting buyers. Investments are enormous and it appears now only those of the strongest financial entrenchment will weather this period of depression.

The farmers of Andover rightly feel that their produce is being marketed at ruinously low prices. But compared to the Canadian farmer their prices seem reasonably high. In Canada today potatoes may be bought for ten cents a bushel, but for 20 cents a pound, grain, meat and other produce proportionately low in price.

Unemployment is fully as serious a problem in Ontario as in New York State, many people will have to be helped thru the coming winter. The attitude of the Canadian people and their reaction to present conditions is intelligent and courageous. They are a kindly people, very patriotic and possessed of a very high average standard of morality.
